Avoid handling - they carry the bacteria Salmonella which usually does not cause any illness in reptiles, but can cause illness in humans. Their lifespan can vary from 5 to 20 vears.

## FIVE-LINED SKINK

SCIENTIFIC NAME: Plestiodon fasciatus CLASS: Reptile CONSERVATION STATUS: Least concern

The Five-Lined Skink's diet consists mostly of crickets, slugs, and caterpillars, but they also eat spiders, termites, frogs, and smaller lizards.

Females lay 15 to 18 eggs which takes about 24 to 55 days to hatch.

The Five-Lined Skink grows approximately 5 to 8 ½ inches long. When threatened, it can lose its tail which confuses its enemy and allows it time to escape! Its tail will eventually grow back.

> They can be found hiding under cover, such as logs or rocks.

When they are young, they have a blue tail. When they mature, it turns gray, brown, or green.

## Population

The species is endemic to North America and is one of the most common lizards in the eastern U.S. They can normally be found in damp forested areas and around structures.
